



Holy Comforter's operating surplus (offering income in excess of expenses) during March was \$12,742.59. Total giving to support Holy Comforter's routine expenses for the month was \$40,314.00. The budget estimate of the amount needed each month in 2024 is \$30,278.50. The year-to-date surplus, through March 31, was \$4,855.26. Year to date spending was \$9,732.51 below the amount planned in the 2024 budget. The foregoing table provides additional perspective and comparisons with offering income, expenses and budgets in prior years.

Grace and peace,

I've been really excited about the weather warming up lately, and the days getting longer. Last night after dinner I helped my boys take their kayaks out on the water across from our house and paddle around for a while, when not long ago it was dark by the time I got home from work. It is crazy how easily I forget that it's the case, but I get fed by being outside. Apart from time with certain people, it tends to be spending time outside that helps lower my blood pressure, put aside to do lists, and find joy being present in the moment. This time of year makes me excited to be able to find more time outside, whether because of the sun being out longer or the temperature being warmer. I know plenty of folks who are already planting and tending gardens, going out on camping trips, enjoying sports, and all sorts of other outdoor activities. It's a fun time of year as things are awakening (and creating lots of pollen), reminding us that we're in the season of Easter and the new life it brings, and bringing a sense of hope.

There are a lot of hard things going on in the world, and from conversations I have with people, a lot of hard things going on in people's lives individually as well. If you allow yourself, it is easy to think that the bad things are the main things, or even the only things, going on. It is kind of like how watching the news makes you think that people are horrible and the world is a terrible place, but then when you walk out into it you can quickly be reminded that people are kind and there is so much good in the world as well.

I wonder, what are the things, people, or places that bring you joy, that remind you of goodness in the world, that bring you hope? It might be time outside like it can be for me and other folks. It might be cooking, crafts, music, or other forms of art. It might be reading, playing or watching sports, time with friends or family, acts of mercy and compassion. I'm intentionally listing things that aren't directly church related like scripture and worship because what I want you to consider is how Christ is, or could be, at work within those everyday things that bring you joy, that fill you up, that give you joy. I think all too often we do not consider the ways Christ is at work in all parts of our lives, how the entire world is wrapped up in the Easter story of resurrection, new life, and hope, and how often the things that bring us joy, feed us, and give us hope, are things in which that Christ is at work, perhaps not overtly (I don't think Christ cares who wins or loses sporting events), but in the way we use those things to create beauty, to bring people together, to care for others, to help us or others to grow, or perhaps more accurately the way Christ uses those things through us. What is the thing that brings you joy, that fills you, that gives you hope, and how is Christ at work in it for your sake and for the world?

Who remembers their first church lock in? Do remember your first mission trip? The first time you spent more than 2 hours with your church friends and made memories and laughed at inside jokes for hours? Friday, April 12th, we had a lock in for all our Holy Comforter Youth (HCY). We played "get to know you" games, played running and playing games, watched the Barbie movie, made birthday cards for kids living at Catherine's House, and we had faithful conversations about gender inequity, friends, and faith.

If I'm honest with you, lock ins are made to be more fun for youth than the adult leaders. I know, what a surprise (read that with a hint of sarcasm). Here is what I love about a lock in: I love the community experience bonding. I love the jokes and laughter that is shared. I love how they authentically show up for one another. I love the snacks (when's the last time you ate a cheese ball?!). I love the sound of delirious laughing. Turns out lock ins aren't for sleeping...

At the ripe hour of 11 pm we did a hard questions session. The youth were encouraged to write questions about life or faith; if they didn't have any questions they could write affirmations of youth group. We wrestled with friends, boundaries, standing up for ourselves, where is hell, what is sin, and is it okay to question God. I was amazed to see and hear these young people show love and listened empathetically to one another. No one was alone is what they are experiencing. We heard words of promising to be supportive and friends always. I heard reissuance of everyone belongs here and is wanted here. Lock ins aren't just for staying up all night...

This lock in reminded me of the hands that hold the church, the people who are leading, and it gave a glimpse of what the church will be like. Lock ins aren't for sleeping and staying up all night; lock ins are for getting a peak at honest community, being the body of Christ, and feeling hope for how the church will grow. Y'all our youth group is something special, take a moment to behold them. The church is in good hands.

In furtherance of Holy Comforter's 2024 goal to expand our congregation's ministry to all in the rapidly growing Belmont area, with a specific focus on the young professional and LGBTQ+ communities, your pastoral staff, church council, and evangelism committee are pleased to introduce the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) program.

The RIC program is offered by ReconcilingWorks: Lutherans for Full Participation, a non-profit ministry formally recognized by the ELCA that advocates for the acceptance, full participation, and liberation of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions within the Lutheran Church. Approximately 12% of ELCA churches have already gone through the RIC process and voted to become RIC partners. All RIC churches are publicly identified on the ReconcilingWorks website, where people searching for an intentionally inclusive faith community in their area can easily find them.

Holy Comforter's RIC process will be led by the RIC Core Team, which is forming now and which seeks a few more individuals to join. The RIC Core Team will meet at least monthly, with specific dates and times to be determined by the general availability of team members.
